Legislation

Supplemental IV

<u>Timeline</u>: We could see a **draft from the Senate majority as early as Wednesday**, though others have said early next week may be more likely. When text is released, it will be the product of a majority-only exercise – **bipartisan negotiations have yet to begin**. House leadership has told their membership to be prepared to vote the first week of August, so the July 31 enhanced unemployment insurance deadline may come and go. Notably, in a House Budget hearing last week, a witness said it would take states a full **two to three weeks for states to restart the current unemployment insurance (UI) programs if they expire**. In a White House <u>press conference</u> with Republican leaders today, Treasury Secretary Mnuchin said the administration was committed to passing a bill before the July 31 deadline.

<u>Process/Politics</u>: Leader McConnell, Secretary Mnuchin, and White House Chief of Staff Mark Meadows will be outlining what is in the bill to Republican senators at the Senate GOP lunch tomorrow. Feedback from that meeting as well as others will continue to inform what is included as drafting continues.

Democrats likely won't put out anything new before they see what Republicans present. Democrats have continued to roll out new proposals (Sen. Wyden and Leader Schumer proposal on unemployment insurance, white papers on health care and testing) and highlight various provisions from the Heroes Act. Democrats are keeping a number of issues on the table – many see discarding anything this early as short-sighted, since no

have been talking about many other issues, including **rental assistance** and **supporting communities of color**, which have been disproportionately impacted by the virus.

<u>Policy</u>: The House passed the Democrats' opening bid for the next bill, the Heroes Act, on May 15. While it's been over two months since House passage of the bill and the contours of the debate and which issues are most pressing have shifted slightly, it can still serve as a marker of what Senate Republicans will be responding to in their bill. While text of the Senate Republican bill has yet to be released, the will likely include the following:

- Liability protections for employers and other organizations
 - An <u>outline</u> believed to be from McConnell's office was released last week and dictated that organizations would only be liable if they failed to make "reasonable efforts to follow applicable public-health guidelines and committed an act of gross negligence or intentional misconduct".
 - While the Heroes Act did not include broad liability protection, Rep. Lou
 Correa is said to be leading Democratic efforts to find what Democrats could
 live with. Reps. Garret Graves (R-LA) and Henry Cuellar (D-TX) have also
 released a liability protection proposal a few weeks ago. Text here.
- · Health funding, specifically for testing and vaccines
 - The Heroes Act included \$75 billion for testing and \$3.5 billion for BARDA vaccine development.
- · Education funding, specifically for school reopening
 - Assistance likely not be conditional on a school reopening.
 - The Heroes Act included \$100 billion for state and local funding for schools.
- Changes to the Paycheck Protection Program
 - Nonprofits will be eligible.
 - Application will require businesses to show a 50% or more reduction in revenues to qualify for a second PPP loan.
 - Eligible businesses will be limited by the number of employees it has.
 - Senate legislation has the limit at 500 employees, while House legislation places the cap at 100.
- Sector-specific provisions Senate GOP leadership has indicated that these
 types of provisions must be COVID-19 related, have strong support from Republican
 members, and be necessary for immediate relief.
- Some form of funding for funding for state, local, and tribal governments, though
 the level of funding and whether to included flexibilities or certain limitations has yet
 to be agreed upon.
 - The Heroes Act designated a little under \$1 trillion for state, local, tribal, and territorial governments.
- A "fix" for enhanced unemployment insurance.

- Republicans Sen. Portman and House W&M Chairman Brady have both presented proposals that would offer bonuses to workers returning to work.

- While a payroll tax cut hasn't necessarily been mentioned by GOP leadership,
 President Trump has pushed for it in the past. In response to a question he received
 on it today, he said it was very important, though only one of the many elements
 being discussed.
- In today's press conference, Secretary Mnuchin also mentioned tax credits for businesses to purchase personal protective equipment.
- While it's been made clear by Republican leadership that non-COVID items will not
 be included in the next bill, there are several expiring authorizations that need to
 be reauthorized. If those programs are included in this bill in a miscellaneous title, it
 could open the door for non-COVID-related items to be included.

New Implementation Information and Guidance

- 7/17 The Federal Reserve announced that it had expanded the Main Street Lending Program to include options for nonprofit organizations. Applications and other key forms will be posted soon. Press release here. Nonprofit term sheet here.
- 7/17 HHS announced that a second round of money for hot spots will go out this
 week, possibly as early as today. Qualifying hospitals will be paid \$50,000 per
 eligible admission. HHS press release here. To be eligible for this round, hospitals
 needed to have one of the following be true:
 - Have more than 161 COVID-19 admissions between January 1 and June 10, 2020; OR
 - One COVID-19 admission per day; OR
 - Have experienced a disproportionate intensity of COVID admissions (exceeding the average ratio of COVID admissions/bed).
