Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order: None

**Food Service:** Restaurants reopened statewide on May 15 with these <u>guidelines</u> in place. Bars were permitted to reopen at 50% capacity on May 28. On June 12, Gov. Reynolds lifted the 50% capacity limit.

lowa Gov. Kim Reynolds said she would reassess the 10 p.m. curfew on indoor restaurant dining she imposed as of midnight Monday night within a week to see if the limitation can be lifted or new restrictions are warranted. She also specified in announcing the measure Monday night that restaurants or hotels cannot hold private events for more than 15 people, a directive certain to affect their group bookings for the upcoming holiday season (source).

Tyson Foods Inc., which says it produces 20% of the beef, pork and chicken in the U.S., has suspended managers at an Iowa plant accused of participating in a betting pool on how many employees would become ill with COVID-19 (source).

## **November 17**

Iowa Secretary of Agriculture Mike Naig announced Monday that more than 200 local meat and poultry processors have been awarded Meat Processing and Expansion grants through the Iowa Department of Agriculture and Land Stewardship. These small businesses can use the funds to purchase or upgrade equipment, develop a direct-to-consumer sales strategy or participate in food safety certification training (source).

Kim Reynolds announced in a news conference on Monday evening that Iowans will be required to wear masks when indoors and unable to social distance starting Tuesday, along with other new restrictions (source).

# **Indiana State Update**

**Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order:** expired statewide May 4 – expired in Marion County on May 15.

**Restaurants:** Restaurants in all counties except Marion, Lake and Cass were able to reopen at 50% capacity on May 4. Restaurants in Marion, Lake and Cass counties have all been able to reopen since. Restaurants are currently operating at 75% capacity and bars are operating at 50% capacity. On Saturday, September 26, limitations on bars and restaurants were lifted. # **Pennsylvania State Update**

**Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order:** expired statewide May 8 – Berks, Bucks, Chester, Delaware, Lackawanna, Lancaster, Lehigh, Northampton, Montgomery and Philadelphia counties remained under the order through June 4.

**Restaurants:** Counties in the green phase may reopen bars and restaurants at 25% occupancy for dine-in service and outdoor service if they follow the appropriate <u>guidelines</u>. On-site alcohol sales at bars and restaurants are banned in Allegheny county. Gov. Tim Wolf allowed restaurants to increase indoor capacity to 50% on September 21 if they self-certify by October 5. Starting Nov. 20, bars and restaurants in Philadelphia will not be permitted to have indoor parties or indoor dining.

# **November 24**

On Nov. 23, Gov. Wolf and Secretary of Health Dr. Rachel Levine announced that the retail food services industry, including bars, restaurants and private catered events must end alcohol sales for on-site consumption at 5 p.m. on Nov. 25, 2020 only. In addition, indoor dining capacity at Pennsylvania restaurants is now at 25%, or 50% if the restaurants self-certify (source).

#### November 17

On Monday, Philadelphia city officials announced that they would roll back the modest concessions granted over the last several months, effective Friday, eliminating indoor dining altogether and limiting outdoor tables to parties of four people who live in the same household (source).

## **November 10**

Across the state from Oct. 19-25, the Department of Agriculture's Bureau of Food Safety performed 15 coronavirus complaint-driven inspections. Nineteen coronavirus complaints were referred to local and county health jurisdictions. Sixty-one complaint-driven educational letters and one formal warning letter were issued (source).

# **California State Update**

**Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order:** Yes – no official end date.

**Food Service**: On July 13, Gov. Newsom ordered all counties in the state to close all bars and the indoor operations of businesses including restaurants, movie theaters and museums, as Covid-19 cases continue to climb. The businesses will be allowed to operate outdoors, if possible, except for bars, he said. Current guidance can be found for restaurants <a href="here">here</a>.

Los Angeles County officials have announced new coronavirus-related restrictions that will prohibit in-person dining for at least three weeks as cases rise throughout the holiday season, according to the Associated Press. The new rules will take effect Wednesday at 10 p.m., meaning restaurants, breweries, wineries and bars will only be able to offer takeout, drive-thru and delivery services (source).

The first phase of a survey of California farmworkers about the impacts of COVID-19 found a community afraid to seek medical help, suffering financially more than most groups and missing out on information and guidance due to language barriers. The study, undertaken on short notice by a consortium of groups, led to a series of recommendations to improve assistance to workers who survey representatives said are three times more likely to contract COVID-19 than those in other jobs (source).



# **Texas State Update**

**Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order:** expired statewide April 30 – the city of Austin and Travis County will remain under the "Stay Home, Work Safe" order until December 15.

**Food Service:** Bars were ordered to close by Gov. Abbott on June 26. They can remain open only for to-go or delivery. Restaurants were ordered to reduce their capacity from 75% to 50%. You can find more information about the minimum standard health protocols required <a href="here">here</a>.

Thousands of families — including some who waited nearly 12 hours — turned out Saturday at the usually empty grounds of Fair Park for the North Texas Food Bank's fifth and largest megadistribution of food during the coronavirus pandemic (source).

# **Michigan State Update**

Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order: expired June 1

**Restaurants:** 32 counties could reopen bars and restaurants at 50% capacity on May 22 if they followed these <u>guidelines</u>. On July 29, Gov. Whitmer closed down indoor bar service statewide. Outdoor service and restaurant service were able to remain open. On Nov. 15, Gov. Whitmer ordered restaurants close indoor dining.

# **Minnesota State Update**

Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order: expired May 18

# **November 24**

Gov. Walz says that he intends to soon announce a major state relief plan to help small businesses during the COVID-19 pandemic. According to Walz, he will call a special session on Tuesday in order to approve the plan, which will include sales tax mitigation. Both small businesses and the <a href="https://documents.com/hospitality/industry">hospitality/industry</a> have struggled during the pandemic and its resulting restrictions (source).

Minnesota turkey farmers who took a financial hit because of the COVID-19 pandemic could be eligible for assistance through a state cost-share program. Approximately \$1.25 million is available in the program, including about \$750,000 for producers and up to \$500,000 for processors (source).

Minnesota milk, meat or poultry processors can access financial support to provide a safe environment for employees and customers during the COVID-19 pandemic through a new cost-share program from the Minnesota Department of Agriculture (MDA). USDA- and state-licensed processors located in Minnesota with fewer than 200 employees can apply by Dec. 4, 2020 for the <u>Protect Our Milk, Meat, and Poultry Processors (POMMPP) Cost-Share program (source)</u>.

## **November 17**

A recent change because of increasing COVID-19 cases means that the 79th annual Minnesota Farmers Union convention will be held virtually this Saturday, Nov. 21 (source).

Under new restrictions Gov. Walz put into place on Nov. 10, bars and restaurants are required to end dine-in services between 10 p.m. and 4 a.m. Indoor capacity will also be capped at 150 people. Bar seating will also be closed, with the exception of establishments that only have bar seating (source).

On Friday, Gov. Ricketts said if coronavirus patients begin to occupy 25% of hospital beds, the state will impose, or reimpose, a number of restrictions that previously had been in place. New restrictions would include requiring bars to return to carry-out and delivery service only (source).

## **November 10**

The number of people hospitalized with the coronavirus in Nebraska continues to increase steadily. The state said another new record was set Sunday when 794 were hospitalized with COVID-19, up from 760 the day before. That number has more than doubled over the past three weeks as cases continued to surge in the state (source).
