On Feb. 10, House Democrats advanced a proposal to provide more than \$16 billion in relief for the food and agriculture industry. The House Agriculture Committee approved the measure 25-23 along party lines after considering about a dozen amendments during a lengthy markup. The proposal is part of the sweeping \$1.9 trillion COVID relief package that Democrats are pushing through Congress (source).

#### February 9

Governor Kim Reynolds signed <u>a new public health proclamation</u> Friday afternoon lifting all COVID-19 restrictions on businesses and gatherings. The proclamation went into effect on Sunday, Feb. 7 at 12:01 am. (<u>source</u>).

#### February 2

Debt collections, foreclosures and other activities on certain farm loans are now temporarily suspended. The U.S. Department of Agriculture made the announcement on Jan. 26 in response to the ongoing coronavirus pandemic (<u>source</u>).

lowa restaurants and bars struggling with COVID-19-related reductions in business will be able to apply for one-time grants under a new state program, <u>Gov. Kim Reynolds announced Jan. 21</u>. The \$40 million Iowa Restaurant and Bar Relief Grant Program will give grants of up to \$25,000 to restaurants and bars that saw a decrease in gross sales in the second and third quarters of 2020, compared to the same period in 2019 (<u>source</u>).

<u>Reopens Restaurants, Bars, Banquet and Catering Facilities and Services to Dine-In Service, with Exceptions.</u>

On Feb. 11, Gov. DeWine announced that the 11 p.m. – 5 a.m. curfew has been lifted due to decreasing hospitalization numbers (source).

#### February 9

Ohio is on track to potentially lift its COVID-19 curfew if hospitalizations stay on the decline. They've been lower than 2,500 for seven days and the governor is expected to revisit the measure this week (source).

#### February 2

In accordance with the White House memo, <u>Regulatory Freeze Pending Review</u>, the U.S. Department of Agriculture has suspended the processing and payments under the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program — Additional Assistance and has halted implementation until further notice. Farm Service Agency local offices will continue to accept applications during the evaluation period (<u>source</u>).

#### February 2

The Indiana Senate voted 40 to 8 Thursday to approve broad civil liability protections, including a prohibition on class-action lawsuits, against legal claims filed by individuals who say they were exposed to the coronavirus at a business or any organized event or activity (<u>source</u>).

The extra restrictions on business operations imposed Nov. 30 by the Lake County health officer to minimize the spread of COVID-19 were rescinded Jan. 29, effective immediately. Dr. Chandana Vavilala said the countywide limits on business capacity and hours, including at school and recreational sporting events, appear to have helped reduce Lake County's COVID-19 testing positivity rate and the number of COVID-19 hospitalizations (source).

A more contagious variant of the coronavirus that was first identified in the United Kingdom late last year has been found in Indiana, state health officials announced Monday (source).

The COVID-19 Hospitality Industry Recovery Program will distribute \$145 million in funding to all 67 counties in Pennsylvania. According to Gov. Tom Wolf, funding will be given in the form of block grants to each county based on population (source).

#### February 9

Nine members of the Pennsylvania delegation in the U.S. House of Representatives sent a letter last week to House leadership urging the inclusion of the RESTAURANTS Act in future COVID-19 relief legislation. The act would establish a \$120 billion restaurant revitalization fund at the U.S. Department of Treasury to provide grants to small restaurant chains, independent restaurants, and catering firms with 20 or fewer locations doing business under the same name. Grants would be used to cover most expenses such as mortgage, rent, utilities, payroll, benefits, debt obligations to suppliers, and food (source).

#### February 2

The <u>Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture</u> announced Jan. 26 it <u>ordered three restaurants in the state to close</u>, a decrease from 15 restaurants given notices the previous week. The latest round of inspections took place Jan. 18-24 (<u>source</u>).

# **California State Update**

#### February 23

This week, Orange County will start setting aside doses of COVID-19 vaccine for workers in education, child care and **food and agriculture**, officials said. The county plans to dedicate 30% of its vaccine allocation to workers in those sectors, as well as to those in emergency services. The remaining 70% will go to residents 65 and older (source).

Workers in education, child care and food and agriculture will be eligible to receive vaccinations in San Francisco starting Feb. 26 and in Los Angeles starting March 1, although public health officials in both counties have warned that the pace will be slowed by limited supply. Long Beach, which has its own health department and receives its own vaccine supply, started vaccinating some food workers and educators last month (source).

California lawmakers on Monday cleared the way for 5.7 million people to get at least \$600 in one-time payments, part of a state-sized coronavirus relief package aimed at helping those with low-to-moderate incomes weather the pandemic (source).

#### February 16

A number of West Coast cities have recently moved to require that large grocery chains offer employees what has come to be known as "hero" or "hazard" pay for working on the front lines of the coronavirus pandemic. Now, officials in Coachella, California, say they are the first in the U.S. to offer the same financial bonus to farmworkers (source).

#### January 26

California Gov. Gavin Newsom on Monday announced the state will be transitioning to prioritizing age for COVID-19 vaccine eligibility after seniors and essential workers receive their shots. After those 65 and older, health care workers and essential workers like first responders, teachers and **food and agriculture workers** are inoculated, the state is moving to an age-based vaccine prioritization system, the governor said (<u>source</u>).

#### February 23

Gov. Abbott has requested a USDA disaster designation for Cameron, Hidalgo and Willacy counties in response to severe winter weather that has impacted the state. This designation would make federal assistance, such as emergency loans, available to agricultural producers who have suffered losses in designated counties, as well as in counties that are contiguous to a designated county (source).

#### February 2

Gov. Abbott today announced that the Texas Health and Human Services Commission will provide approximately \$300 million in emergency Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) food benefits for the month of February as the state continues its response to the COVID-19 pandemic (source).

#### January 12

The Hays County judge is ordering bars that don't meet qualifications to <u>operate as restaurants</u> to shut down once again under state restrictions from Gov. Greg Abbott. <u>Gov. Abbott's order</u> places 50% occupancy limitations when more than 15% of overall hospitalizations in any trauma area are COVID-19 hospitalizations for seven consecutive days. Trauma Service Area O, which includes Hays County and the surrounding Austin area, exceeded that 15% threshold from January 3 through January 9 (<u>source</u>).

Trauma Service Area Q – which is made up of Harris, Fort Bend, Montgomery, Austin, Colorado, Matagorda, Walker, Waller and Wharton counties – has had seven consecutive days of <u>COVID-19</u> hospitalizations above 15% of total hospital capacity. According to a state order, the counties must pause elective surgeries and scale back indoor business capacity to 50%. Bars are also ordered to stop indoor service (<u>source</u>).



# **Michigan State Update**

Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order: expired June 1

**Restaurants:** On Nov. 15, Gov. Whitmer ordered restaurants close indoor dining. Restaurants may reopen on Feb. 1, with a capacity limit of 25% or 100 people.

The Michigan Department of Health & Human Services announced workers in food processing and agricultural settings will be able to get vaccinated as of March 1. This includes about 79,000 Michiganders, officials said. This will help ensure the health and safety of Michigan's essential food and agriculture workers and keep the state's food supply chain moving, MDHHS said in the release (source).

#### February 9

Michigan officials sent cease-and-desist orders or suspended food licenses at 21 restaurants and food establishments since Dec. 1 for violating COVID-19 health orders and being a hazard to the public health. Six restaurants had their food license suspended — and five of the six suspensions are still in place. Another 15 businesses were sent cease-and-desist orders, which is a lesser violation (source).

A key state House committee approved <u>a series of bills</u> Wednesday that allocate <u>billions in federal COVID-19 relief</u> funds, but <u>hold back billions more</u> or offer the already appropriated money with strings attached (<u>source</u>).

#### January 26

Michigan's indoor dining industry will be able to resume serving customers Feb. 1, although capacity will be capped at 25 percent — with a limit of 100 people — and doors will have to close at 10 p.m. (source).

On Jan. 6, Gov. Walz announced that he's relaxing COVID-19 restrictions for Minnesota bars and restaurants, which have been closed to indoor dining for the last six weeks. Loosened restrictions were also announced for movie theaters, gyms, places of worship, and small gatherings. On Wednesday morning ahead of the official press conference, the governor said he is adjusting the dials on state COVID restrictions, allowing bars and restaurants to reopen indoor dining at 50% capacity, or up to 150 people. Restaurant tables will be able to seat up to six people, and bars will be able to seat groups of two. Under the new rules, reservations will be required, and establishments must close by 10 p.m. (source).

#### **December 29**

The Minnesota Department of Health announced Monday, Dec. 28, it issued a cease-and-desist order and notices of license suspension to Long Pine Store and Pizza north of Pine River after determining it violated an executive order intended to minimize the spread of COVID-19 (source).

#### February 9

On Tuesday, Mike Boell, who owns the Oakland Meat Processing Plant, and Anna Zeleny joined Johnathan Hladik, policy director for the Center for Rural Affairs, in Lincoln to testify before the Nebraska Legislature's Agriculture Committee in support of a bill that would provide muchneeded support for producers, processors and consumers affected by the coronavirus pandemic (source).

Nebraska will start issuing emergency supplemental nutrition benefits on Feb. 9, state officials said Monday. The Nebraska Department of Health and Human Services said recipients of the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, known as SNAP, will get more money on their electronic benefit transfer cards (source).

#### **November 17**

On Friday, Gov. Ricketts said if coronavirus patients begin to occupy 25% of hospital beds, the state will impose, or reimpose, a number of restrictions that previously had been in place. New restrictions would include requiring bars to return to carry-out and delivery service only (source).

#### **November 10**

The number of people hospitalized with the coronavirus in Nebraska continues to increase steadily. The state said another new record was set Sunday when 794 were hospitalized with COVID-19, up from 760 the day before. That number has more than doubled over the past three weeks as cases continued to surge in the state (<u>source</u>).



# **Georgia State Update**

**Stay at Home/Shelter in Place Order:** expired April 30 for the general public – older persons and the chronically ill were under a shelter in place order through October 15.

On Monday, the Atlanta City Council voted to pass <u>a resolution</u> urging the state to make more essential workers eligible at this time for the COVID-19 vaccine. The resolution, <u>from Council members Antonio Brown and Dustin Hillis</u>, which passed 14-0 as part of the consent agenda for Monday's council meeting, specifically requested the Georgia Department of Public Health revise the 1A+ population category, which defines who is currently eligible to receive the vaccine in Georgia. Brown's resolution calls on the state to expand eligibility during the 1A+ phase to include the <u>CDC's full list of essential workers</u>. It includes individuals working in child care, education, public transit, grocery stores, manufacturing, **food and agriculture**, corrections, and the U.S. Postal Service.

#### **December 22**

The Georgia Fruit and Vegetable Growers Association, GFVGA, in collaboration with the Georgia Department of Public Health, Georgia Department of Agriculture and the University of Georgia Extension, has developed a practical and comprehensive COVID-19 handbook for growers and farm labor contractors in the specialty crop industry (source).
