

HPAI Checklist

Plan in advance

If

	Maintain biosecurity at the highest level.
	Meet with state agriculture/animal health officials now. If your state has an active outbreak, remember those officials may be dealing with additional outbreaks also.
	Identify channels and secure vendors for specific HPAI-related supplies.
	Have testing supplies on hand to test flocks for HPAI swiftly. <u>See APHIS sampling methods here</u> .
	Ensure someone in your operation is familiar with Secure Egg Supply permitting guidance for the movement of hens, shell eggs and egg products.
	Find your DUNS number and apply for a <u>SAMS Unique Entity Identifier (UEI)</u> . Effective April 4, 2022, the federal government will require a UEI for all entities on indemnity forms.
	Gather information for the indemnity forms.

	Test your birds! Remember to take duplicate samples for shipment to state lab and NVSL.
	Lock your facility down. Move nothing in or out other than the samples for testing.
